# Department of Political Science Oakland University Approved by the Department: November 20, 2014

### WORKLOAD STATEMENT

The Department of Political Science places high value on faculty teaching. At the same time, our tenure-track and tenured faculty are also expected to pursue scholarship and engage in departmental and university service. As such, we aim to create a faculty workload that can allow faculty to devote sufficient time to teaching, research, and service.

## Normal Workload

The typical workload for a tenure-track or tenured faculty member is a 3-2 course load. Normally this would be 20 academic hours, composed of five four-credit classes. In many cases, faculty teach the same class each semester, so that there are fewer than five course preparations each year. In recent years, we have not granted a special research leave for faculty with a more active research agenda, although this issue has been raised—especially by junior faculty—from time to time.

Our special instructors, who have no research or service obligations (although some do engage in department or university service) normally teach a 3-3 load.

Spring/summer teaching is entirely optional for all faculty.

### Administrative Course Reductions

The department chair, responsible for various administrative matters in the department, teaches a 1-1 course load.

The Director of the Masters of Public Administration, who oversees that program and supervises the MPA coordinator, teaches a 2-1 course load.

The department has two internship directors (one for PS and IR and one for PA undergrad and graduate). Their work is not only during the academic year but extends over the summer (the department offers the internship course in the summer but these instructors do not receive summer pay for this course).

The Coordinator of the International Relations Program receives a one-course reduction (2-2 load) for a variety of activities in the department, some of which are also undertaken in the summer.
